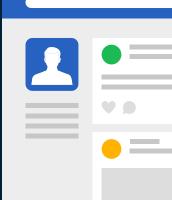

Pick the channel that best works for your business goals. All of them have something a bit different to offer.



Facebook AGES 18-44

- 1 Engage followers without them having to leave Facebook.
 - You may post external links with your posts, but to boost engagement, try including a question or poll.
- Use Stories as an alternative to posts and reach more people.
 - Stories allow you to bypass the Facebook algorithm and grab people's attention, creating interest in your page
- 3 Prioritize practical, optimistic, informative content.
 - Personal success stories
 - Helpful tips, guides, statistics, and resources
 - Ask questions and give answers
- 4 Publish more videos.
 - Facebook has made it clear that videos perform better.



Instagram AGE 35 AND UNDER PHOTO-SHARING

- 1 Switch your profile to a business account.
 - Go to your profile and select the top right hamburger icon ≡
 - Select Settings, then select Account
 - Select Switch to professional account
 - Tap Business and follow next steps
- 2 Know your audience.
 - Curate messaging to your audience.
 What do they want and/or need to know?
 What do you want them to know?
- 3 Define goals.
 - What is your page's primary focus? Education? Promotion? Both?
 - Write an Instagram bio about who you are and what people can expect from you.
 - Share your clinic's mission and vision.



Twitter AGES 18-49

- SHARE THOUGHTS
- 1 Write clear and concise messages under 280 characters.
- 2 Use hashtags wisely.
 - Research popular hashtags.
 - Do not use more than two hashtags.
- 3 Have a quality over quantity mindset.





How to Save Images and Text from this PDF

- How to Post on Instagram
- 1 Save this PDF to your computer to location of your choice.
- 2 Open the file. Click on the Attachment icon @ to view a list of images and animations.
- 3 Shift-click on all the file names and click Save Attachment. Choose the location where you want to save the files.
- 4 Next, highlight the text you wish to post. Right-click on the text and select Copy.

- 1 Click on the \oplus sign at the bottom of your screen to start creating a new post.
- 2 Add the photo(s) or video you would like to post and click *Next*.
- 3 If you want to edit or add filters to your post, you can otherwise click *Next* to skip this step.
- Where it says Write caption you can add the text for your post.
- When finished creating your post click *Share* to upload the content. You can also link your Instagram account to Facebook and/or Twitter to have any post from Instagram uploaded to that platform automatically.



- Log into your social media account.
- 2 Right-click in the text field and select *Paste*. Adjust line breaks and spacing as required.
- 3 Add the campaign hashtags and/or choose your own hashtags: #animalhealthweek #AHW2021.
- 4 Click on the Add photo/video icon Select the image (.jpg) or animation (.mp4) you previously saved. For videos, make sure to title your video and add the post text as your video description.
- 5 Both the image and the text should now be visible in the post preview area. Finish by posting or tweeting.

The family pet is a good illustration of **ONE HEALTH**, as pets stand at the confluence of animal, human, and environmental health. Ensure your pets receives regular routine physical exams, vaccines, and parasite prevention to help protect the humans and other animals in your family from parasites such as fleas, tick-borne Lyme disease, ringworm caused by fungi, Salmonella bacteria, and Rabies virus.







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
